What is SBS?

- Comprehensive School and Community Treatment (CSCT) is a school based mental health service provided to students in school by a licensed mental health center.
 - YBGR hires two mental health staff per team:
 - 1. Master's Level Therapist
 - 2. Bachelor's Level Behavior Specialist
- Outpatient Therapy
- Community Based Psychiatric Rehab and Support (CBPRS)

GOAL of the SBS Program

The primary goal is to help high-risk students be successful behaviorally, socially, emotionally, and academically.

We seek to accomplish this goal through:

- Decreasing problem behaviors and facilitating the student's social, emotional growth so they are able to remain in regular public school settings
- Provide individualized mental heath services, coordinated with the student's education
- Build social and academic skills
- Provide counseling and support to parents/families

What does this mean for you?

- YBGR and your school have agreed to house a team(s) on site within the school.
- The therapist(s) will schedule individual, group and family therapy sessions with the youth in addition to providing classroom services.
- The behavior specialist(s) will provide behavior intervention to individuals and groups between classes, during lunch, after school, and will also work with teachers to be in the classrooms when beneficial to the youth.

SBS Program Facts:


- SBS Team(s) are available during school hours, contact their office or cell.
- Team(s) work with the students throughout school breaks, including Christmas and summer.
- Team(s) are required to attend IEP meetings, if requested, for their client to coordinate services with IEP accommodations.

SBS Caseload/Referrals:

- Each SBS team typically serves 10-12 students depending on the need/severity.
- Anyone can make referrals to the SBS Program (parent, school staff, case manager, etc.).
- Please feel free to ask questions or consult with us on who you feel may need emotional/behavioral support. The therapist is able to assess for the clinical criteria of the program.

SBS Referral Flow Chart:

- Referral source obtains referral form from SBS team.
- Referral source completes Referral Form.
- Referral Form is given to School Admin, School Counselor, School Psychologist and/or school designee who then contacts parent/guardian regarding the program.
- School Admin, School Counselor, School Psychologist and/or school designee works with SBS team to determine the priority and need of the referrals.
- SBS team processes the referral.

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SED Diagnosis

Serious Emotional Disturbance refers to a youth who meets the requirements for a qualified diagnosis and has behavior impairment in various settings.

Common SED Diagnoses:

- Anxiety
- Depression
- Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)
- Oppositional Defiant Disorder
- Bipolar Disorder
- Autism

SED Diagnosis

What might a student with an SED look like in the school setting?

- Arguing, fighting, hostility, overreacting, impulsive, inattentive, hyperactive
- Withdrawn, tearful, lack of peer relations
- Continuously needs to be redirected or disciplined
- Irritable, low frustration tolerance
